Background Information:

Education Code Section 42127(h) states that, no later than 45 days after the Governor signs the annual Budget Act, districts shall make available for public preview any revisions in revenues and expenditures that your LEA decides to make reflecting the funding made available by the Budget Act. Governor Gavin Newsom signed the 2022-23 Budget Act on June 27, 2022. The full impact of these budget changes, along with District staffing and enrollment changes, will be reflected in future monthly budget updates to the Board and the First Interim Budget report.

Significant Changes in the Budget Act since May Revision

The Budget Act resulted in significant changes to education both fiscally and programmatically. Fiscally, education will receive increases that are both ongoing and one-time in 2022-23. The Budget Act includes the following funding priorities:

- Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) Increase: \$8.9 billion increase which includes \$772 million in funding for districts and charter schools, \$2.82 billion for declining enrollment, \$997 million for TK expansion, and \$4.32 billion base increase.
 - The new LCFF calculator is expected to be released in late July or early August (not yet released as of 8/4/2022) with the following:
 - Base increase (LCFF Investment) of 6.28%
 - The COLA remains the same as May Revise at 6.56%.
 - Transportation add-on increases annually by COLA or 60% of reported transportation costs
 - Note a Transportation Plan will need to be adopted by April 1, 2023, and updated annually.

- TK add-on of \$2,813 per TK ADA which is adjusted annually by COLA.
 - Universal TK programs include updated TK certification requirements and "Adult" staffing parameters. Beginning in 2022- 23 LEAs must offer TK to four-year-olds whose fifth birthday occurs between September 2 and February 2, inclusive. The range changes through 2025-26.
- COVID-19 ADA Relief: To mitigate the ADA losses, the Act approves ongoing and one-time allowances for school districts and charter schools. Below is a table of the ADA options for each fiscal year 2021-22 and 2022-23.

Ungoing Funding:

- Expanded Learning Opportunities Program includes a \$4 billion increases for LEAs equaling \$2,750 per pupil if UPP ≥ 75% or \$1,940 ≤ 75%.
 - Program changes were also included in the Budget Act, which are being evaluated to assess impact on WUSD program operations.
 - 2022-23 ELOP funding for WUSD is projected to be \$1,306,122.
- Universal Meals and Meal reimbursement rates increase for meal reimbursement rates. The Budget Act increases the rate to \$4.625 per meal served. Beginning with 2022-23, all LEAs are required to provide two free meals per day to any student who requests a meal.
- Special Education base rate increase of \$500 million. This increase raises the base rate to \$820 per ADA. Additionally, Special Education Extraordinary Cost Pool increased to \$20 million, which could be enough for full reimbursement. This <u>may</u> reduce our Excess Costs due to Glenn County SELPA.

♣ One-time Funding:

- Learning Recover Block Grant provides LEAs funding to assist with long-term recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. It's estimated the funding will be approximately \$2,400 per pupil and will be based on 2021-22's Second Principal Apportionment ADA multiplied by 2021-22 UPP. Update budget to include funding accordingly.
 - Note: Interim expenditure reporting will be required and a final report will be due by December 1, 2029. These funds may be used through 2027-28.
 - Projected allocation for WUSD is \$2,425,581
- Arts, Music, and Instructional Materials Discretionary Block Grant provides LEAs funding for instructional materials and professional development aligned to best practices for improving school climate, digital literacy, physical education, and learning through play. It's estimated the funding will be approximately \$666 per pupil and will be based on 2021-22's Second Principal Apportionment ADA.
 - A plan will need to be discussed and approved for expenditure of these funds.
 - Projected allocation for WUSD is \$865,437
- Green School Grants include \$1.125 billion for Hybrid and Zero-Emission Truck and Voucher Incentive plus \$375 million for zero-emission school bus charging or fueling infrastructure and related activities.
- *Kitchen Infrastructure Grants* included \$600 million for LEAs to make kitchen infrastructure upgrades, purchase equipment, and provide training/compensation related to school meals.
 - This funding is approximately 5 times more than 2021-22's funding. Eligible LEAs will receive a \$100,000 base allocation.
 - 2021-22 allocation to WUSD, was \$66,634; assuming similar allocation factors apply in
 2022-23, five times the 2021-22 funding amount would be \$333,170.
