Introduction

The current number and percentage of Unduplicated Free & Reduced Meal Program/English Learners/Foster Youth for Willows Unified School District (WUSD), in the 2013-14 school year is: Murdock Elementary = 501 (79% of total enrollment); Willows Intermediate School = 225 (65% of total enrollment); Willows High School = 246 (57% of total enrollment); and Willows Community High School = 20 (87% of total enrollment). For the 2014-15 school year, Willows Unified School District will spend an estimated \$400,000, an increase of over 9.68% over the prior year, of supplemental and concentration funds to support the EL, LI, and Foster Youth subgroups by performing the following actions:

- * Provide Professional Development opportunities for all Staff, to include Bilingual Instructional Aides, who work with targeted subgroups;
- * Hire an additional second grade teacher to lower class size;.
- * Increase monies allocated to Teachers for classroom materials and supplies;
- * Provide additional Intervention opportunities for all students, specifically targeting subgroups;
- * Implement the Positive Behavior Intervention Supports (PBIS) program districtwide;
- * Implement a K-5 model for Response to Intervention (RTI) to work with targeted subgroups and to compliment the PBIS program;
- * Develop and incorporate additional strategies to encourage parent school connections;
- * Increase the use of specific data (e.g., CELDT, BPST, and/or Teacher developed assessments) to target the specific educational needs of the students;
- * Enhance the current CTE offerings and examine the feasibility of adding additional CTE sections.

These actions are the most effective use of our supplemental, core, and base funds because they target all students, as well as, all three subgroups, in all state priority areas.

The current number and percentage of unduplicated Free & Reduced Meal Program/English Learners/Foster Youth for Willows Unified School District (WUSD), in the 2013-14 school year is: Murdock Elementary = 501 (79% of total enrollment); Willows Intermediate School = 225 (65% of total enrollment); Willows High School = 246 (57% of total enrollment); and Willows Community High School = 20 (87% of total enrollment). As you can see, these subgroups represent a majority of the students at each school and clearly indicates a need to address all the students in the District, as well as, targeting the subgroups.

For the 2014-15 school year, Willows Unified School District will spend an estimated \$400,000, an increase of over 9.68% over the prior year, of supplemental and concentration funds to support the EL, LI, and Foster Youth subgroups by increasing and/or improving the services for these unduplicated students as compared to the services by provided to all students. The goal of providing additional Professional Development for all staff, lowering class sizes at the elementary level, increasing classroom materials and supplies budget for every teacher, providing additional interventions, implementing the Positive Behavior Intervention Supports program district-wide, and implementing the Response to Intervention at the elementary levels will assist every student in reaching his/her potential. The additional support necessary at the high school will develop through enhancing current CTE offerings and exploring the option of adding sections.
